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### A MESSAGE FROM **REV. CRAIG SUMEY**

Thank you for how you, the members and attenders of 1stPres church, have journeyed together through the past year and demonstrated what Jesus' grace can do among people who hold it dear.

2020 has seemed, simultaneously, to be both a wonderful and horrible year, and certainly a year like our church hasn't experienced for some

time. What began as most years have, normally and hopefully with exciting signs of continued growth, was disrupted dramatically by the impact of the COVID-19 global pandemic starting in late March, requiring us to limit and then restrict in-person gatherings for worship, study and the work of the church. Our staff has spent most of the year working from home. Some of us actually tested positive to the virus because of our interactions with each other. We have struggled to learn, quickly, new ways to stay connected with each other when we cannot safely gather. However, we've also become a more prayerful people this past year. We've adapted to new technologies and forums for connecting with each other. We've stepped up to care for and serve our most vulnerable members and neighbors in the community.

2020 was the year for my long-planned sabbatical study project and three-month leave. I had received funding from the Louisville Institute's Pastoral Study Project grant, and the Sabbatical Management Team and I spent months arranging temporary pastoral coverage through the Rev. Jennie Barber, and guest preaching from a variety of speakers. When my study leave began the first day of May, there



was still hope that the COVID-19 pandemic was largely going to be short-lived. Clearly, I would never make the choice, again, to be apart from the church during such a disruptive and difficult time. But the time of study was very rewarding, I was able to rest and refresh (helped a bit by quarantining), and spend great quality time relationally with

Lynn. I am energized by what I learned and how it will help the church face the coming decades of ministry.

The loss of a long-serving and much-loved church staff member is always a bit traumatic under the best of circumstances. Relationships in the church can be very strong and deeply personal. When a staff member is dismissed under difficult circumstances which, for the sake of privacy and confidentiality, cannot be fully divulged, it is especially hard for everyone involved. Steve Balas' contribution to 1stPres' mission in a variety of roles is greatly missed by many, and the end of his tenure has raised concerns about the church's role and procedures when issues with staff members arise. Many of us are still working through our feelings about what happened this past summer. However, it has led to an evaluation and update of our personnel policies so they can offer the best possible protection for both our staff and the church. We have gained important wisdom about how to best communicate through conflict and disagreement in the church. We are taking advantage of the opportunity to offer special ministry for our Middle School and High School students and find better ways to serve them in the coming years.

Periods of struggle, disappointment and even failure are never what we hope or plan for. When we're experiencing them we wish they would go away so we can get back to times of harmony and ease. But it's also true that these periods are a chance for greatest growth in our perspectives and relationships. It is a grief that some 1stPres'rs who have felt particularly concerned or in conflict with the church's actions and the circumstances of this past year will not take this journey with us, but we wish only the best for them as they continue to follow Jesus and find community. We also believe that experiences like this can lead us to deeper faith, greater wisdom, stronger connections and exciting missions for Jesus in the world.

As I think about 2021 I see an opportunity to be even more creative, innovative and bold in our covenant to be the church for each other and our community. We are thankful that the COVID-19 pandemic will begin to ease as promising vaccines are distributed more widely and we can safely return to our gatherings for worship, fellowship, study and serving. But it's clear that we will continue to have restrictions in some form for a good part of 2021, we will need to continue to be sensitive about vulnerable members and attenders as well as the healthcare system in our community, and we will continue to be challenged to put LOVE1st...first.

I also believe that the positive and helpful things we have experienced this past year, we will want to continue to do and improve upon. We have a chance to reexamine what we do as a church so we can maximize online accessibility, individual care and prayer, and ways we keep each other safe.

The events of this past year have hit our community hard. Neighbors who were already economically vulnerable will be in precarious positions this year as jobs do not return, businesses close and protections run out. This will negatively impact their

ability to care for themselves and their families, physically, emotionally and spiritually. Children, young adults and senior adults will be especially at-risk. Political and social upheaval will continue to cause many to question who they can trust and what they can believe in.

My mission, and I hope 1stPres' mission in 2021, will be to manage ourselves and function as well as we can as a church so that we have maximum desire, equipping and ability to share God's love, provision and hope with our community. Many will be looking to the church as representatives of a good God and loving Savior to meet darkness with light. We have lots of LOVE1st mission to accomplish this year, perhaps more than we ever have before.

Thank you, Session members! These were serious issues with which to deal and has resulted in a revised Personnel Policy Manual. Thank you, Personnel Team!

### **ADMINISTRATOR BONNIE PIOVESAN**

Trauma is something that we as people continue to study. The advancements we have made in

identifying and treating trauma are truly astounding! Yet I think the word trauma itself sparks a bit of concern – maybe even fear, because we've come to understand how damaging it can be in a person's life. In our efforts to study and help those with trauma, we stumbled upon something more powerful than the trauma impact on the brain-resilience.



Resiliency is the ability to recover

from the difficulties of life. It's the ability of a substance to spring back into shape or stretch and not break, and for people it develops into a toughness or courage. We see people around the world and throughout history overcome the most difficult of circumstances, and we are awestruck by their courage.

This year has not been the most difficult of my life, and I feel a little silly to say at times I needed courage. I didn't need courage to face the world, I needed courage to face my own attitudes. It is so easy to run in fear when things are unknown. It is so natural to lash out in anger when things are unjust. I am so great at giving my all-important opinion when what's really needed is to listen. I so easily justify working myself to exhaustion even when I know God has asked me to rest in Him. If I ever needed courage as a Christian, this was the year.

Jesus set an example for me to follow: humble, serving, bold, loving, and prayerful. As a follower of Christ, I made the decision to live my life in service to Him and to study His ways, not mine. So with prayer and the support of those around me, I found ways to stretch and not break, to recover quickly, to spring back with joy, and to value rest and prayer.

As resilience helps develop courage in a person, the natural outcome is hope. It is easy as a Christian to talk about hope, but it can be weary walking in hope. The most common thing I heard people hoping

> for this year was that things would go back to normal. We all pinned our hopes on something getting us back to that normal place. But hope is not about what we had, it is the hope of what is to come. Hope is unknown, unseen, and unfamiliar; no wonder we need courage. I can face the things I already had, been there, done that. It is the unknown that is scary and exciting. It is like a roller coaster: you are strapped into a tiny car

going slowly up a big hill, scared, and excited, about the coming plunge and the thrill of speed, hoping you don't fall out of the car.

I can face 2021 with an excited kind of hope, as we work together on new things. The possibilities of what lies ahead are endless. With every new challenge in our community, there is a new opportunity to get creative and watch the church grow. As we shed off the old normal, we can discover new ways to be the hands and feet of Jesus to those who don't know Him. When we work together for the bigger picture of the Kingdom we long for, we find a new love for one another. So here we all are at the end of 2020, more resilient and ready to face the New Year with courage and hope. Because God loves us so much we do not have to walk this road alone; we have each other and what a blessing that is.

Our plans of having a big community Vacation Bible School were altered; instead,


we had the opportunity to partner with and support local small businesses. Hands to Art provided a wonderful morning session for our summer camp



#### THE YEAR IN REVIEW

The ADT was off to a busy start this year until COVID-19 brought normal activities to a screeching halt, and forced a change in the way activities were conducted. Consequently, most of the activities this year were a continuation of ones started in 2019 or earlier. Some activities were able to be in-person, but most ended up being on-line. There were a few new study or training sessions undertaken prior to the pandemic, and there was a new initiative to enroll the Church in Right Now Media as a resource for adult education.

- Eleven Christ Care groups continued to meet through the year, averaging 11-22 members.
- Dan Brown led a Saturday morning Bible Study/book group.
- Wendy Wilson did a midweek power-lunch program on the book of John which was well-attended.
- Also well-attended were Bible studies on Ephesians and Colossians led by Carolyn Fish. They were mid-afternoon classes held twice monthly and were usually coordinated with Venture.
- Carolyn Fish and Wendy Wilson led Peer-to-Peer training for leaders on how to facilitate a group in order to make more group studies available during Venture or elsewhere in the church.
- Flying Solo continued for adult singles or people who attended without spouses, and there were 43 attenders. They had one activity before COVID-19, which was a line-dancing lesson, with a buffet dinner and fellowship.
- Venture met twice before COVID-19 with much success. Craig's 101 class had 15 attenders!

- The 925ers, a group for young working adults and families were unable to have an event this year because of COVID-19, but there seems to be an ongoing interest in maintaining the group.
- There were some men's group studies at the Iron Horse, and a men's retreat was planned, but had to be canceled.

The major new initiative was to enroll the Church in Right Now Media, a multi-faceted digital resource that could be used by congregant's family and friends. The ADT was able to purchase this resource from funds that had been appropriated but not

used. Currently, Right Now Media is being used by about 90 members and several groups. There was discussion about its continued use for 2021, and it will be offered for the first five months of the year—while at the same time, other resources will be reviewed and, hopefully, eventually offered.

2020 has been an extremely difficult year for us all, and it serves as a reminder of how blessed we have been to live and serve as we have in past years. It also

reminds us of how blessed we are to have a church of faithful members who continue to worship, and to serve to bring God's love to all. We can do this because of God's faithful presence with us. We hope that each of you can participate in some way in adult discipleship offerings in the coming year, so that together we can continue to grow in the mind and spirit of Christ.

### BUILDING & GROUNDS GERRY GEE

Before the virus hit, the building & grounds committee surveyed the staff and toured the church facility and grounds to identify and prioritize tasks that needed to be accomplished to keep the facility looking attractive and well-maintained. In addition to the identified tasks, the committee established a list of items to be completed on the Spring workday. Due to COVID-19 the workday was modified from a group activity to having individuals sign-up and complete the tasks on an individual basis. Kathy Hickman and Lynne McCall decided to postpone the planting of the planter boxes with flowers until we had a better idea on the impact of the virus and its potential spread. Hopefully, we will be able to have flowers planted again next year.

Painting continued to be a top priority this year. The hallway on the second floor of the Hunter Building was painted. This enabled Carley to have a mural painted on a portion of the hallway. The main hallway from the rear Fireside entrance to the entrance to Krueger Hall and office areas/ work room were also painted. Prior to painting the reception area, the receptionist counter was shortened to provide a more effective and pleasant environment. These tasks were coordinated and accomplished by Bruce Wallies and Allen Miller assuming the lead. Additional helpers included John McRae and Steve Peterson.

The early season snowstorm that we had in October did significant damage to many of the trees on

the church property. Brody spent his first day or two on the job assisting in cutting-up downed branches and cleaning-up limbs and debris. There are still numerous maintenance tasks that need to be completed next year. Hopefully, we will be able to assemble workgroups as we have in the past to not only accomplish the work to be done, but to also enjoy the fellowship of each other's company.

### **FAMILY PROMISE TERI BURCH**

First Presbyterian continues to be one of over 20 churches to participate in Family Promise of North Idaho (FPNI). Family Promise stretches across the United States with more than 200 affiliates. It is estimated there are around 6,000 congregations involved nationwide and one out of every 30 children in America will experience homelessness each year.

In 2020, First Presbyterian hosted 4 different weeks. We hosted January 5-12 and March 8 – 15. These were fairly normal hosting times with congregation volunteers setting-up, helping with meals, groceries, hosting dinners, overnight hosting, laundry, and taking down. During this time, we had one family in January with two adults and two children. In March, there were three families, and we sheltered 5 adults and 5 children. We had a new challenge of honoring a family's choice of eating vegan foods.

When the pandemic hit, our next turn to serve were the weeks of September 27-October 4 and November 1-8. Cindy Wood, Executive Director of FPNI, sent out an appeal for snowbirds to loan houses, apartments, condos, or cabins to house our homeless children and their families. She and her staff also wrote and received grants through the CARE act to pay for hotels. It was called a "static" location: no moving from one place to another. The Coordinators were asked to provide meals and groceries for our quests. The coordinators were notified weekly of changes and updates.

We began the September week with two families. We served 2 adults and 5 children. One of the children had a birthday that week, and a gift was provided. Directions to coordinators and volunteers were to drop-off requested groceries on Sunday along with their first meal. We got informative fliers that stated, "Leave meals at the guest's motel

front door. Knock on the door 1st-leave the meal and do not enter the room." A family exited the program on Monday. That is a very difficult thing for volunteers and coordinators, because we want to know why, and if they are okay. We have to have faith. That left one adult and one child (a baby). They were a delight to serve.

During the time we served in November, we started with one family: the adult and baby. The food coordinator's decided to not organize volunteers at this time, but deliver a serving of whatever we were having at home. Two days later, another family joined, and at the end of the week, a third family joined us! We ended up with 4 adults and 6 children! Thank God for our precious volunteers who could be called at the last minute and help serve a family of five. It was also at the very end of the week that the mother and baby graduated to housing. Cindy Wood said that no guest tested positive for the COVID-19 virus, so far.

2020 has been like no other, and we still had people wanting to help either with monetary donations or continuing to cook and deliver. Ann Smart has volunteered to coordinate laundry when we are able to serve in our church again. Bill and I are grateful to everyone who helped or contacted us asking what they could do. You all are a blessing. Thank you to the First Presbyterian staff for their support and great communication while we were serving. Eric and Chris Fehr are stepping-down as hosting coordinators, and it is critical that we have replacements when we go back to serving at First Presbyterian Church. Four weeks of helping children and their families is a meaningful experience.

### **FINANCE JON HIPPLER**

Your Finance Committee is usually not on most of our congregation's radar screens. The work we do doesn't show up in the form of community projects, fundraisers, mission support, etc. Yet, our responsibilities are among the most important to our church's operations and its ability to pursue and achieve its strategic initiatives.

The Committee in 2020 was made up of Jon Hippler (Chairman), Steve Morman, Allen Miller and Jerry Gee. We were ably supported by our bookkeeper, Stephanie Rogge and our administrator, Bonnie Piovesan. Regarding these two people, I can only say how fortunate First Presbyterian is to have them on staff. Rarely, in any organization, do you find people of this quality. Stephanie is amazing in her meticulous preparation of the Church financials, payroll preparation, bill-paying and banking relationships. Bonnie supports the committee

Give. and it will be given to you. Good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap. For with the measure you use it will be measured back to you. Luke 6:38 with her vendor management skills as well as her overall knowledge of church operations and needs.

The Committee is responsible for the monthly review of the Church's financial statements including any resulting deviations from the budget before presenting them to Session for their approval. We also, on a monthly basis, monitor the collection of the pledges for the Capital Campaign to build Krueger Hall. Most of the pledges are coming in on a timely basis and being applied to the balance of the construction loan. That loan at year-end had an outstanding of \$131,617.00 (down from \$350,000). Finally, the Committee is responsible for the preparation of the annual budget. The 2020 budget was presented to the Session in December of 2019 for approval. The main assumption driving this plan was, of course, the estimated level of giving we would see from the congregation. Based on 2019 levels, we estimated total giving in 2020 at \$624,000. Then came March 2020 and COVID-19. The pandemic has greatly disrupted most aspects of the Church's operations since then including a reduction in giving levels due mainly to the lack of in-person services and offerings at those services. As a result of reduced giving levels, the actual level of total offerings for the year was \$553,867.47. Because we were also able to reduce expense levels in some areas, the Church ended up with a manageable operating loss for the year of only (-\$21,076.23).

It is thanks to the strong support of our congregation that FPC has been able to weather the financial disruptions caused by COVID-19 and end up in a very solid position at the end of 2020. With the vaccines now available, hopefully the time is not too far off when we all can gather in person again with the resulting positive impact on our offering levels and a return to normal operations.

### PASTORAL RELATIONS STEVE MORMAN

Since this was the first pastor sabbatical in well over

30 years, the committee's goal was to provide the congregation with our regular Sunday morning worship, guide the church staff, and be Moderator of Session as seamlessly as possible. Then COVID-19 hit literally as the Sabbatical started adding its restrictions and interruptions to the plans.

The team worked diligently for 8 months in uncertain times to overcome these challenges and support the congregation, church staff, Pastor Craig's sabbatical, and continue the mission of 1st Presbyterian Church.

Craig submitted his project paper on December 31, 2020 and is the process of working on it further to prepare for sharing with the congregation and for publishing.

I commend the team members for their extraordinary work and commitment to serving our congregation. We are grateful to the Rev. Jennie Barber, who served as the temporary Head of Staff and Pastor in very challenging circumstances for ministry.

trays or having communion by intinction,


where the bread is dipped into the cup. Those of us watching the service on You Tube provided our
