As many of you know, we endured months of repairs from the Hunter Basement flood last fall. However, this resulted in newly remodeled spaces

This includes sparkling spaces for the Love 1st Last January, we made the decision to include 'Safety Neighborhood Closet and the downstairs bathrooms. and Security' within the purview of 'Building and The Committee devoted countless hours to installing Grounds' as these two groups often work closely cove base, painting, replacing and repairing lights, and assembling furniture for the 1st Neighborhood

We had another utility issue this summer: as the main water line serving the Sanctuary broke near the meter in the basement with new carpeting, cove base, and at the base of the front entry stairs. This has also now been repaired and includes a newly updated backflow device and easier access to the main shut off for this building.

We have hosted both a spring and a fall work day, attended by our committee members as well as numerous congregational volunteers who helped us clean the basement, clean gutters, downspouts and roof drains, clean out flower beds, rake leaves and other needed activities.

Bruce Wallies and Allen Miller have been incredibly devoted to the group, moving cabinets in the Fireside Room and giving it a much-needed coat of paint, re-installing the large, wooden First Presbyterian Church signs (one north of the Family Life Center Building facing Lakeside Avenue and another one in the History Room), and repairing ceilings in the Sanctuary Basement. The Committee also spent a few work days cleaning out and reorganizing the Sanctuary basement to get it ready for paint and some cosmetic improvements in 2023.

We cleaned out the bell tower and installed a permanent ladder within it for future access. We also continue to help the staff as needed with snow removal and any building maintenance items needed around our facility.

Vision Statement

This has been quite a year for our Children & Family ministry! We were sorry to say goodbye to Director Carley Walker, who completed her Masters degree and was immediately snapped up as a special education teacher. We were thrilled to see her begin a new chapter in her life and grateful that Naomi White, followed by Kyler O'Connor, stepped in as interim directors. The program has remained steady and strong while our committee used this interim time to evaluate and enhance programming for the future.

Beginning in March, most of our C & F Committee joined together with several other committees in a virtual class entitled, "Reimagining Children's Ministry" sponsored by Barna, a nation-wide Christian Research

team (newly named the Search Team) to create a new Vision and Mission Statement, along with a job description for the posting of the Director of Children & Family Ministry position. After working with HR and obtaining approval from Session for the new position, it was posted at the end of July 2022. Our applicants have been few, with little to no experience in children's ministry. We are confident that God will send us the right person in His own time.

Our program continues to flourish, thanks to: Kyler O'Connor, who has done a great job keeping us up and running; our C & F Committee that has been steadfast in its ongoing support all year long; and our amazing Search Team members who have given hours

of their time, knowledge, and experience in paving the way for our new

director. Our children have had many opportunities to experience God's love and grow in their faith through Sunday School, Venture, summer camps, and many other activities throughout the year. It is exciting to witness the growth in our ministry! We look forward to God's plan for us in 2023.



Organization. From March through June, they listened to specialists working in children's ministry to discuss the challenges that ministries face today, as well as their suggestions and areas of focus for the future. Upon completion of the class, Session asked this committee to continue their work as a task force for determining and establishing future goals for our children's ministry. This inspired the

The mission of the Community Outreach team is to take the wonderful warmth, love and sense of community from inside our church out into the local community. We want to reach out to people with the love of Christ.

In 2022, the team sponsored two food drives for items that went to the Community Action Partnership Food Bank. February's food drive was Souper Bowl Sunday. June's food drive was "Hunger Doesn't Take a Vacation." In October, the team sponsored "Snack Attack" to gather healthy snacks for school-age children and for the Love 1st Neighborhood Closet. The majority of the snacks were distributed to the schools from the Love 1st Neighborhood Ministry.

The team staffed the "Welcome Desk" each Sunday to reach out to new visitors from the community. This year, we gave 60 welcome bags to new visitors. The bag included a list of the month's activities and a small book on prayer.

The team organized the Fall Festival in October which was at the same time as the Downtown Association's Apple Palooza. There were booths for children's crafts, Fall tattoos, and an animal petting zoo. The Children & Family team had a photo booth, and the Youth team had a hot chocolate and apple cider booth. This Fall Festival activity was visited by hundreds of people from the community. Many people from our congregation volunteered to make this event a huge success.

The team has many members playing a major role in the Love 1st Neighborhood Closet which is providing a free shopping experience in our facility

for families in our community who need clothing for their elementary age children.

There were many other church teams and projects that our congregation regularly supports that are also outreach activities. Examples include: Mission team activities, Family Promise, and Ecumenical Food Kitchen

Under the Leadership of interim Pastor Neal and now permanent Pastor McLane, the Contemplative Planning Committee has worked diligently over the past year to refine our 10:30 service. Keeping the parts that worked well, eliminating the parts that didn't and always focusing on how we could bring our congregation a better experience has resulted in a weekly gathering that we are pleased to

present. We feel our efforts now provide a beautiful,

intimate service that offers a place to be at peace

with our Lord.

As our Sunday service hand-out states, "This service will contain many planned spaces of silence to give your heart and mind room to open and reflect, rest, and hear the still, small voice of God. This silence is safe. Be at peace."

Incorporating traditional elements such as the lighting of the Christ Candle, acoustic music, a relaxed version of the day's sermon, responsive prayers, weekly communion, and a joint recitation of the Lord's Prayer, the contemplative service offers both individualized and shared opportunities to pray about and meditate on thoughts and ideas that may arise during the service. Pastor McLane often poses questions to help facilitate this process, and attendees are encouraged to use the journals we provide for those who wish to capture moments of enlightenment.

Over the past year, we have witnessed our regular attendance more than double in size, as we welcome more than 30 people weekly now. Childcare is offered for those who are in need, and we close



DEACONS

2022 was a year for growth and change at 1st Pres and for the Deacons as we continued to learn from and work with interim Pastor Neal Nybo and then welcomed permanent Pastor McLane Stone. Deacons continued with many of our small-scale, long-time service works, but once again looked to new ideas for the two biggest ministries (meeting clothing needs locally and serving families at Christmas). We met monthly on Zoom and in person throughout the year.

Deacons began the year with an examination of how we and 1st Pres could better serve our community with our clothing ministry, previously called the annual Back-to-School Clothing Giveaway. At the prompting of Pastor Neal, the idea for a collaborative effort was presented by Diane Wakkinen and Pastor Neal to the Session. After three months of meetings, a collaborative task force was created with Deacons, elders, staff, and members from the congregation participating. This task force was later re-named the Love 1st Neighborhood Ministry, and its first project became the 1st Pres Neighborhood Closet. The task force, with the support of the Deacons and Love INC, also hosted two events: Redemptive Compassion Training (RCT) and a seminar by Lois Tupyi, the author of RCT. These events were open to 1st Pres, other churches in the area, and several non-profit agencies. Deacons were happy to be an integral part of the formation and implementation of these endeavors, and many Deacons are still involved with the project.

We continued our monthly contributions and working relationship with Love INC. Love In The Name of Christ is a Christian non-profit helping

connect local churches with community resources to better assist individuals and families who come to us for help. Requests coming from four local families were referred to Love INC for further contact and interviews. The Deacon's Fund and our supply of previously collected clothing was used to help three other families. Deacons listened to presentations by Katie Comstock (past Executive Director for Love INC) and Maggie Lyons with Charity Reimagined. Both presentations focused on new ways to look at charitable giving and support that seek to empower and bolster the dignity of those receiving the help (Redemptive Compassion). The Deacon's Fund was also used to provide monthly support to St. Vincent de Paul and their community resource programs which help many of the same people who contact local churches for assistance.

Throughout the year, we also continued with our other missions: to honor and recognize the church staff through our Office Uplift program; stay in contact with church members who can no longer attend services in person through the Friends-at-Home program; contact those needing prayer and spiritual support as they face illness, loss, and hardships through the Sonshine and Hospital Visitation programs; facilitate communion for both services; and help with 5th Sunday ushering and greeting duties.

Finally, Deacons organized two new events this Christmas: Christmas for the Closet and the Festive Christmas Families Dinner. Christmas for the Closet was our Deacon-sponsored drive to re-stock the Neighborhood Closet. Clothing needs were printed on tags and made available to the congregation to

purchase and donate. The first-ever Festive Christmas Families Dinner was a new look at blessing the local community and showing Love 1st in action. We reached out to all area elementary and middle schools and received referrals for 12 families who could benefit from joining us for a potluck meal, fellowship with 1st Pres families and individuals, a chili cookoff, and fun holiday family entertainment, including a visit by Santa. It was a huge success, and around 80 people attended the event. Each child who attended was given a special gift, and our quest families were treated to a voucher to come back and visit the Neighborhood Closet, as well as a gift certificate to shop at Super 1. Deacons thank Pastor McLane, Children and Families, Missions, Neighborhood Ministry, and the congregation for their support of this Christmas ministry. We hope this will become an annual event everyone can joyfully anticipate.

We held elections for Secretary and Treasurer at our November meeting. Ellen Taylor will serve as Secretary, and Dan Lauer and Pat Dingman will share duties as Treasurer. Deacon chair/co-chairs will be voted on in January 2023.

Thanks again to the congregation and staff for your continued generosity and support of all that Deacons do in their efforts to be the hands of Christ in our church and community. We look forward to an exciting 2023 and new opportunities to serve.

FINANCE JON HIPPLER

2022 was a very good year financially for First Presbyterian Church of Coeur d' Alene.

For the year, the Church had an operating loss of just \$3,873. This compares to our budget for the year of \$7,624 surplus, for a negative variance of \$11,497. Total giving for the year was \$570,415-compared to an anticipated giving of \$576,000. Again, this is a relatively small shortfall given the size of the budget goal. December giving fell short of expectations possibly due to the bad weather experienced during the month.

It should be noted that the above operating figures are adjusted by removing the one-time income item and recognizing the income of a portion of the Gotz Estate (further explained below) used to pay-off the 501 Building debt (the building we also own at 501 E Lakeside).

The latter figure was especially gratifying given the major changes that took place in church leadership in 2022. During the first 9 months of the year, we hired an interim pastor while a search for a new, permanent pastor was underway. Ordinarily, with an interim pastor attendance and giving levels decline. However, thanks to the great job of leadership by our Interim Pastor Neal Nybo, the opposite happened! And, of course, since our new permanent pastor McLane Stone arrived, that growth has only continued. Another very exciting event took place for FPC in 2022 that very positively impacted the financial position and security of our church.


Ray Gotz was a long-time member of the church who passed in 2021. It was subsequently learned

that Ray left his entire estate to FPC, including his Coeur d'Alene home. The value of all the estate assets was an astounding \$721,000! The Finance Committee recommended to Session that the funds be invested in the following ways:

- Pay-off the long-term debt on the 501
 Building (which was used to partly finance
 Krueger Hall construction), resulting in the
 Church being completely debt-free.
- Allocate \$72,000 to the Mission Committee to be used for existing and new mission initiatives as approved by Session.
- Put \$150,000 in an account to fund future capital needs of the Church.
- Place the remainder of the funds, about \$213,000, in a special checking account that can only be spent with the prior approval of the (then-)Session.

Session approved the above allocation of these funds at their October meeting.

The Finance Committee, with the approval of Session, is currently working with the firm Architects West to design and build a Legacy Giving Wall to recognize Ray's gift as well as serve as a focal point for a new planned-giving program to be implemented by the Church this Spring.

Ray wished to leave a legacy that would bless the faithful ministry of his church family. Ray and Louise believed that First Presbyterian Church was a central part of the faith community of Coeur d' Alene, and their desire was to help sustain its mission into the future.

LOVE 1ST NEIGHBORHOOD MINISTRY GINA DINGMAN

The mission of the Love 1st Neighborhood Ministry is to build relationships with families in our community. Our first outreach to the community started by creating and maintaining a clothing closet at 1st Pres that will serve homeless, low-income and at-risk families with children in grades K-8. We strive to consistently purchase new clothing or very gently worn clothing that is current and in fashion for today's youth.

In the beginning, a Deacon task force was formed to look for a new way to carry on the annual Barb McPoland one-day clothing giveaway, which served those in need with clothing for children going back to school. The task force created committees that developed a timeline to accomplish the new vision, which was an ongoing clothing closet that would provide clothing year-round or children from kindergarten through 8th grade.

The task force chair and the session liaison presented the timeline and request for a start-up budget to session in June 2022. In July 2022, session approved a start-up amount of \$2,500 to build, furnish and fully merchandise a dedicated space for the clothing closet. During the next few months, many session committees donated funds from their budgets, ranging from \$100 to \$1,500 to add to our start-up and operating costs. Many congregants went to the giving portal and generously gave donations. We also applied for a couple of grants from the Presbytery of the Inland Northwest and were granted \$1,500 to purchase clothing and laundry gift cards for the Love 1st Neighborhood Ministry-1st Pres Neighborhood Closet. Financially, together we built a great foundation through the support of so many.

In the summer months, we built, furnished, and merchandised the Neighborhood Closet with the help of many volunteers, Deacon task force members, church staff, our Interim Pastor Neal Nybo, and input from outside agencies.

In August 2022, our congregation got a "sneak peek" at the closet. Ambassadors were on hand to give tours, answer questions and share the excitement of this new endeavor with everyone.

As school started back up in September 2022, Community Outreach conducted the "Snack Attack drive," which allowed us to put together bags of snacks for the 13 schools and our community partners. In October 2022, we had our Grand Opening of the 1st Pres Neighborhood Closet. Our community partners were invited to come visit, as well as our congregation to see what we were all about. In November 2022, we took bags to the schools' counselors and other participating agencies and shared information about our Clothing Closet. The Deacons task force conducted a Laundry/ Hygiene Drive for the closet in August 2022. Then in December 2022, the Deacons followed-up with a "Fill the Neighborhood Closet Shelves" campaign. In December 2022, the Missions Committee gave six \$50 gift certificates from the previous year's 2021 Turkey Drive and ten \$50 gift certificates again from the current year's 2022 Turkey Drive to be given to our families when they visited the closet. These drives have all been supported by our generous congregation members.

Because of the huge support from our congregation, the Deacons, the Session, staff members and

our pastors, the Neighborhood Closet has been fully stocked with a large assortment of clothing, footwear, and laundry/hygiene items, along with snacks for children and gift cards for the families since September 2022 when we opened our doors to serve families through the referral system.

In the past 4 months, we have served 39 families by appointment thru our referral system. The referring agencies (CdA School District, Post Falls School District, Love INC, Family Promise, CDAIDE, and Angel Arms) have all sent in referrals. Most of our referrals are coming through the school districts in our county. These families have brought 95 children through our doors who have been blessed with new or gently worn clothing. The accumulative total of clothing includes: 70 bottoms, 95 Tops, 57 hoodies, 40 pairs of footwear, 95 sets of underwear, 95 sets of socks, 8 dresses, 27 coats, and 19 hat-and-glove sets. All families have also been blessed with a set of laundry and hygiene products according to the size and needs of their individual families. Some families have been blessed with additional help from other resources such as grocery gift cards.

We would like to share that there are so many more people involved in this ministry. There are people who have worked to make this happen: people on the front lines, like our church office staff; others who have been working behind the scenes, such as all the volunteer-"closeteers" who directly serve the families and keep the closet fully stocked; ones who have moved away, like our Interim Pastor Neal Nybo, who was instrumental in planting the seed of this ministry; our present Pastor McLane Stone,

who believes in the vision to serve our community in this manner; and many others who are very actively involved. To each and every person who breathed life into this ministry, your gifts/skills that our Heavenly Father gave you have helped shape this ministry. Thank you. You are the reason we have opened our doors to serve our community by offering a hand-up instead of a hand-out. You are the ones who are building relationships with our community and living the Love 1st mission of our church.

The year 2022 has been such a great blessing to our church and this ministry! Thank you to our past and present pastoral leadership for providing great guidance, to our Session committees, Deacons, to our congregation and our community for believing in the vision and for supporting our ask "by embracing a new way to serve those in need" through this Love 1st Neighborhood Ministry.



MISSIONS MATT BROADWAY

What a dynamic year 2022 has been! The year began while still in the grasp of the COVID pandemic and is ending with much of the worst of those issues behind us – with God's grace! It's nice to meet in person again. Anyone else out there have Zoom fatigue? We have enjoyed the fruitful time of leadership under Interim Pastor Neal Nybo, and we are excited to witness the start of our time of sharing in our Great Mission with permanent Pastor McLane Stone!

We continue to be blessed by the Church congregation and our Session in the support of our Missions activities with 10% of your giving. For this, I'm very grateful, as are our mission partners who are blessed with your generosity. We started the year with 13 regularly supported mission partners and ended the year with the same (not counting other missions we support on an occasional basis). All are doing truly amazing work, often with few resources and under difficult circumstances.

As good stewards of your donations, we are highly focused on the quality and relationships we are building with our mission partners. This year, we embarked on a process of quantifying partnerships to make sure they each fit our vision of a good mission partner. This has led to creating criteria that we can use as a guide to make sure an existing partner, or a proposed new partner, meets our committee standards. We're happy to report that all of our existing partners are folks we still fully support! Should we need to make any changes, we have a good list of contacts for potential new partnerships that we can explore. There's a lot of amazing work being done out there in God's name!

Regular communication with our mission partners is important to the committee as a methodology of focusing on our relationships. As a result, we continue to interview and write an article each month about one of our partners for the Church eNewsletter. As mission committee members, we strive to attend local events hosted by our mission partners and potential partners which are held throughout the year. Hosting a soup table at **Soup**ort the Homeless by St Vincent DePaul was an excellent and fun example. There is much to learn about what they each do while attending these events. Most are open to any congregation member who would be interested in learning more. So, you are welcome to reach out to me if you'd like to be notified of any events that you could attend. I would highly encourage it. Prepare to be inspired!

One annual event that the Missions Committee hosts is the annual Turkey Fund Drive, which we offered again in 2022. Your kind donations go towards buying gift certificates to a local grocery store so families can buy food to enjoy for Thanksgiving and/or Christmas meals. These are distributed through the local school counselors to kids they have identified in need, to a few mission partners, and through a few of our church programs internally.

This year, we decided to postpone our annual Fair Trade Festival and Missions Celebration until the beginning of 2023 in support of the new Love 1st Neighborhood Closet ministry launch. This is a church-wide initiative, and we didn't want to overlap these important events. You will recall that the Missions Celebration is an event where we invite all of our Mission partners and other local connections

to meet with the congregation in Krueger Hall on a Sunday to get to know each other. We look forward to hosting this again in early 2023.

It has been my pleasure to co-chair the Missions Committee with Richard Morrow this year and to work with the great folks on the committee who offer their time and energy to share God's Great Mission through our work with an amazing group of mission partnerships.

Our goal is to make sure that we are working with a good blend of missions that are foreign and domestic, large and small, that offer a nice balance of discipleship and true tangible help for people in need. The church was blessed with a bequest from the estate of Ray and Louise Gotz this year. With the vision of Session, a portion of these funds were set aside for missions work. Our committee is actively creating a grant process for special projects inside and outside the church to utilize these funds, including a potential matching grant program for a mission trip for 1st Presbyterian members – potentially in 2024. The planning is underway!



PASTOR NOMINATING ROGER GRIGG & BECKY CLEGG

Just over a year ago, in December of 2021, the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) met for the first time. Eleven members of the congregation had been selected to serve on this committee. We met with Reverend Sheryl Kinder-Pyle from Presbytery, Pastor Doug Cartwright from Post Falls Community Presbyterian Church (who would serve as advisor to the committee), and Interim Pastor Neal Nybo. At this meeting, Reverend Sheryl explained what would be required of us and the procedures we would need to follow. Her advice to us was that we

could expect this to take between 12 and 18 months before our call would be filled. Cheryl Broadway, Dan Brown, Becky Clegg, Marcy Clutter, Roger Grigg, Jon Hippler, Allen Miller, Charlie Nipp, Tyler Renninger, Linda Scheideler, and Emily Thompson had agreed to serve on the committee. Becky Clegg and Roger Grigg were selected to serve as co-chairs of the committee, and Dan

Brown was selected to be our Tech Coordinator.

We held our first meeting in mid-January. We agreed to meet for two hours every Thursday. First item of business was to begin work on our Ministry Information Form (MIF), the posting we would make on the Church Leadership Connection (CLC) – the "want ads" for Presbyterian clergy. To accomplish this, we divided up the work and formed several sub-committees. Three weeks later, we were up and running with our posting. Another important task was to develop a communications plan to

ensure we were keeping the congregation and other stakeholders "in the loop."

After posting, we immediately began receiving Personal Information Forms (PIFs) from candidates. Some were computer-matched candidates who did not know we were reviewing their PIF and some were self-referrals. Each candidate received an in-depth review, and the members of the committee rated them independently. We watched a lot of YouTube sermons of the candidates during this time. As we identified high-potential candidates, they were set



aside for in-depth review. Over the next several months, we were to receive and review over 100 candidates. On March 30th, we received a PIF and letter from a candidate that we set aside for later review. His name was McLane Stone.

Early on, we developed a philosophy that would carry us through this process: "God has already chosen our next Pastor, and we just need to identify that person."

Fast-forward a couple of months to May 1st as we turned from screening candidates to making

in-depth reviews and hard decisions on the "potential" candidates we had set aside. There were a few new candidates coming through the system. We felt comfortable that one of the three individuals we had identified as our best candidates might be the one. We contacted our three finalists and scheduled in-depth interviews. Each candidate had three interviews: two, two-hour interviews, and a single, one hour-long interview. We reached consensus and invited one candidate to come to Coeur d' Alene for a visit. Cheryl and Matt Broadway hosted a dinner at their home. Afterwards, we knew we had made the right choice. Presbytery Commission on Ministry (COM) had the final review, and we received their approval. A few logistical issues needed to be resolved before we introduced our nominee to the congregation. This may have been one of the most difficult assignments we had received. We knew who it was, but we could not tell anyone yet; but we were so excited! And, you all know "the rest of the story."

A couple of final comments we want to share with you. This was indeed a God-inspired, team effort. Everyone on the committee participated. Most meetings were attended by all eleven members of

the committee and we remained focused. Our biggest criterion for our nominee was that they would be the person to lead us in implementing our Strategic Plan, developed the previous year with Pastor Neal's guidance, and that the congregation would be as excited as we were about our new Pastor and his family. When you have this large of a committee, sometimes different "sides" develop, and it can become contentious. Thankfully, this did not happen with our group! We were inspired throughout the whole process by how God's love is felt by each of us and by this wonderful church family.

We are very proud of the fact that we completed this calling in approximately six months. It took dedication and commitment. We could not have done this without the congregation's support and understanding of our need to protect confidentiality. We also give thanks to our families who had to make plans around the committee's schedule. We have all been truly blessed.

The committee has now been dissolved, but the memory of this great calling will always be remembered by each of us on the committee.

CDAIDE JASON NYE

2022 brought more change for hospitality workers in the CDA region. As the pandemic continued to wind down—fingers crossed—other challenges for hospitality workers in our region showed up. Increases in the cost of housing, especially rent, hit our neighbors in the service industry particularly hard, driving an increased need for financial support. However, with support from donors, local businesses, and increased event attendance, CDAIDE was able to help many of our community members weather this storm.

CDAIDE also saw some changes in our staff this year, with me coming on as the Executive Director, Brenda Wahner joining as a part-time Care Counselor, and Tammy Sandoval taking over as the Marketing, Events, and Volunteer Coordinator. Cindy Ackland remains amazing as ever in the Care Coordinator and Program Assistant roles.

This year, with the support of many of you, CDAIDE paid over \$125,000 in support to local hospitality

workers facing financial crises. Of the 289 hospitality workers we helped, 72% had dependents living at home. 79% were restaurant/food service workers, and 21% were hotel workers. The average person we supported had served over 10 years in the hospitality industry and was around 33 years of age.

As a member of a different church, it has been a unique experience for me working in your beautiful church building. I have really enjoyed getting to know all of you who I bump into throughout the week and appreciate the love and light of Christ that I have seen in your eyes. My faith has grown as I've seen members of different Christian sects coming together to love and support their neighbors. I speak for my entire team when I say thank you for sharing your place of worship with us and for supporting our mission to serve those who serve in the CDA region.

FAMILY PROMISE TERI BURCH

Family Promise of North Idaho (FPNI) is one of many networks in the national system of Family Promise. First Presbyterian Church was one of the first churches to join the system after it was introduced to our community in 2009. FPNI works with homeless children and their families through redemptive compassion. The office staff includes: Cindy Wood as Executive Director; Lisa Donaldson as case manager; Sarah Reser as shelter manager; Crystal Willis as administrative assistant; and, most

recently, Cheryl Hinchliff as office manager. Our church's volunteer coordinators are Judy Flieger, Ann Smart, Bill Burch and Teri Burch. We work most closely with the shelter manager.

Family Promise NI uses our church five times each year to house homeless families and their children for a week at a time. Volunteers provide meals, host those meals, serve as overnight hosts, help with set-up and take-down, and laundry. FPNI asks

volunteers to fill out paperwork to track volunteer time. A background check is done, much like any other system that works with children.

This year, we not only focused on serving the families but making sure we were not wasting food. Food waste can happen when guest plans change, or we ask our grocery donors for more than we need. Through faithful cash donors, we have been able to purchase groceries the night that we meet our guests so we can get just what they need. We also began having left-overs the last night of their stay. If there is any packaged food left, we have begun to send it on with the FPNI trailer to the next site.

Our first guests were hosted in January of 2022. We had two families. One family consisted of a mom who was deaf with a cochlear implant who had three kids ages 8, 5, and 2, while the second family was a dad and his son, age 5.

Our second time to serve was in March of 2022. We were to have one new family, and we were ready with all our volunteer slots filled. However, the family did not show up, so we let everyone know to stand-down until our next hosting.

Our third time to host was an opportunity to help through serving at Calvary Lutheran in Post Falls in late July and early August. We were able to fill volunteer positions not only by First Presbyterian people, but Judy Flieger reached out to other network churches to help host meals and provide overnight hosting. This time, we had three families

to serve: a mom with 4 kids, ages 13, 11, 7, and 5; a young mom and her baby; and the third family was a blended family of a mom and dad with five children, ages 16, 11, 10, 6 and 5. Because there were other custodial parents involved, the schedule for the kids was sometimes quite daunting.

Our fourth time to serve was September 2022 here at our church. We had three families: a mom and daughter, age 10; a father and son, age 6; and a mom and dad with a daughter, age 5, and a brand-new baby.

Our last time to serve in 2022 was in November. We had some return guests: the father and son, age 6; the dad, mom, daughter, age 5, and the baby; plus, we also served a mother expecting her first child.

It takes about 30 volunteers to help provide meals, host the meal, host overnight, help set-up or take-down the beds and rooms, and do laundry. Many of our volunteers do double-duty of making the meal and then sharing that meal with the family; spending the night a couple of times, or helping with both set-up and take-down. Our goal is to add to our pool of volunteers so that no one person gets overburdened. To that end, we are updating our volunteer information packet and recruiting new volunteers. Judy, Ann, Bill and I are blessed with the faithful volunteers and donors we have. If you feel called to help in this important mission, there are packets in the church office. You can also sign-up on the FPNI service board in Krueger Hall.

#3	Administration costs exceeded expected \$9,793.84 due mostly to increased costs of office supplies, postage costs, coffee and donut supplies, etc.
#4	Facilities costs exceed expected by \$120,656.61 due to flood, sewer line repairs, water line repairs (approx \$119,000) and increased electric/gas costs.
#5	Head of Staff costs exceed expected \$26,136.21 due to covering salaries for two pastors for three pay periods in September/October.
#6	Net Operating Income \$282,095 is mostly due to income received from the Gotz Estate and savings in staff salaries (open positions or partially filled positions) and ministry costs.
#7	When income from the Gotz Estate-501 Loan payoff is subtracted from Net Operating Income, we show

a Net Loss for the year of -\$3872.64 compared to an expected gain of \$7,624.

Thankfully, our church returned to two regular in-person services -- at 9:00am and 10:30am -- for all of 2022. However, we found that continuing to provide YouTube live-streaming as well as YouTube recorded videos was appreciated by many. This well-served the people who were too ill to attend in person, those who snow-bird in the winters, those who were homebound, those who were out of town or otherwise scheduled, relatives of congregants living out of the area, and those who couldn't attend in-person for many reasons.
